Ad Hoc Advisory Committee

(Medical Fee Schedule)

Issues

- Administrative burden on medical providers
- Use of single conversion factor in fee schedule
- Provider medical provider (physicians) educational opportunities to learn how the system works
- Issues of communication between stakeholders that contribute to delays in patient care
- Clarification of whether or not deposition costs and fees are considered IME costs



Ad Hoc Advisory Committee

(Medical Fee Schedule)

Recommendations

- Fee schedule MAP mirror Medical Price Index from WCRI
- Change statute and regulation to eliminate single conversion factor
- Provide medical provider (physicians & administrators) educational opportunities
- Study ways to improve communication to decrease delays in patient care
- Clarify language that IME deposition costs and fees are not subject to cap
- Commission assess impact of recommendations on insurance premiums
- Parties to furnish copies of records and reports free of charge



Removal of Parties

Stakeholder's requested consideration.

Removal of parties, legal cost for employers

Parties easy to add, difficult to remove.

Removal requires either

Withdraw Form 50 and refile with new WCC number

Obtain a consent order signed by all parties

Proceed with a decision on the merits

Staff conducting legal research to determine potential solutions.
